From The Desk Of The President:


We are in the process of moving forward with Field Day and Lighthouse Weekend at this time. We are still looking to have an in-person meeting in April at the OEM.

The Antique Wireless Museum Presents K0SM's 3 Hartley

Back in the 1920s, when electronic breadboading often used a real wood breadboard, swiped from the kitchen in the dark of night, a limited supply of commercial electronic components inspired ham radio hobbyists to roll their own capacitors, inductors, switches, and whatever else was needed to build a transmitter.

Today, Andy Flowers, call sign K0SM, recreates early transmitters using the same techniques and components that were used back in the day, and he uses them on the air. Most of Andy's transmitters are based on the oscillator circuit that Ralph Hartley designed while working for Bell Telephone in 1915.
